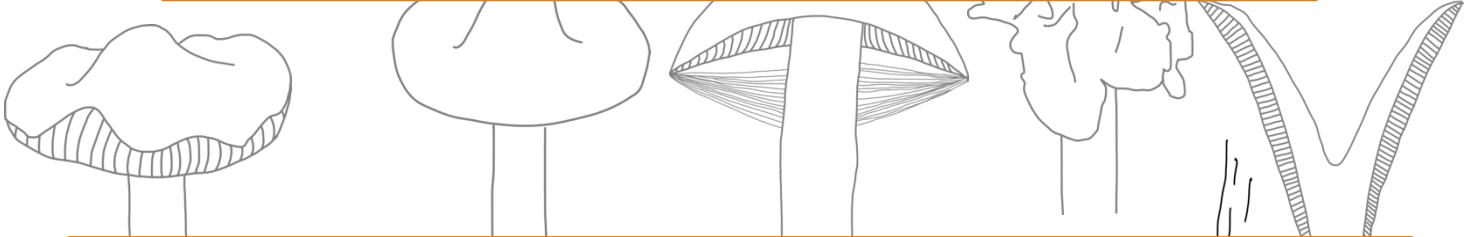

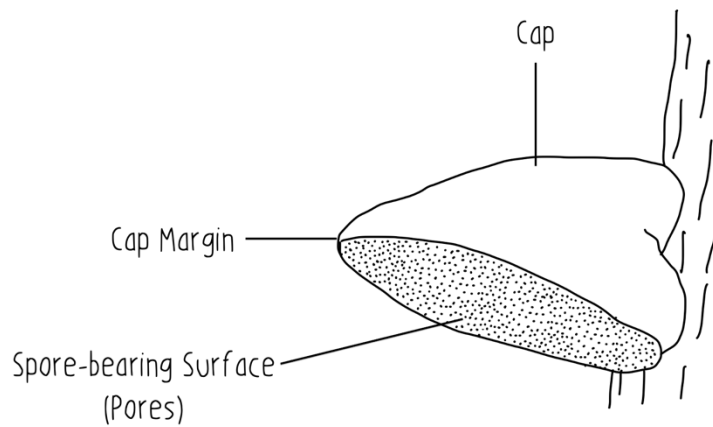
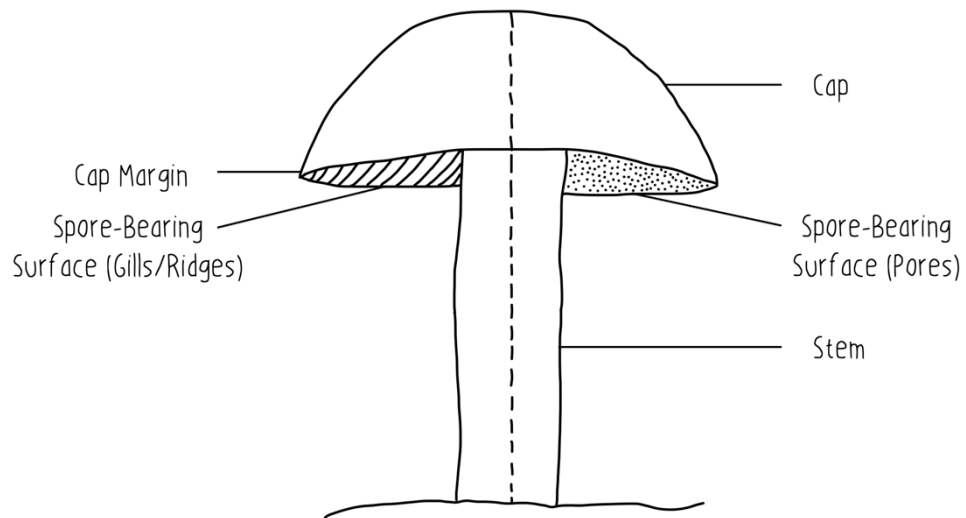

Overview drawing of classic cap mushrooms



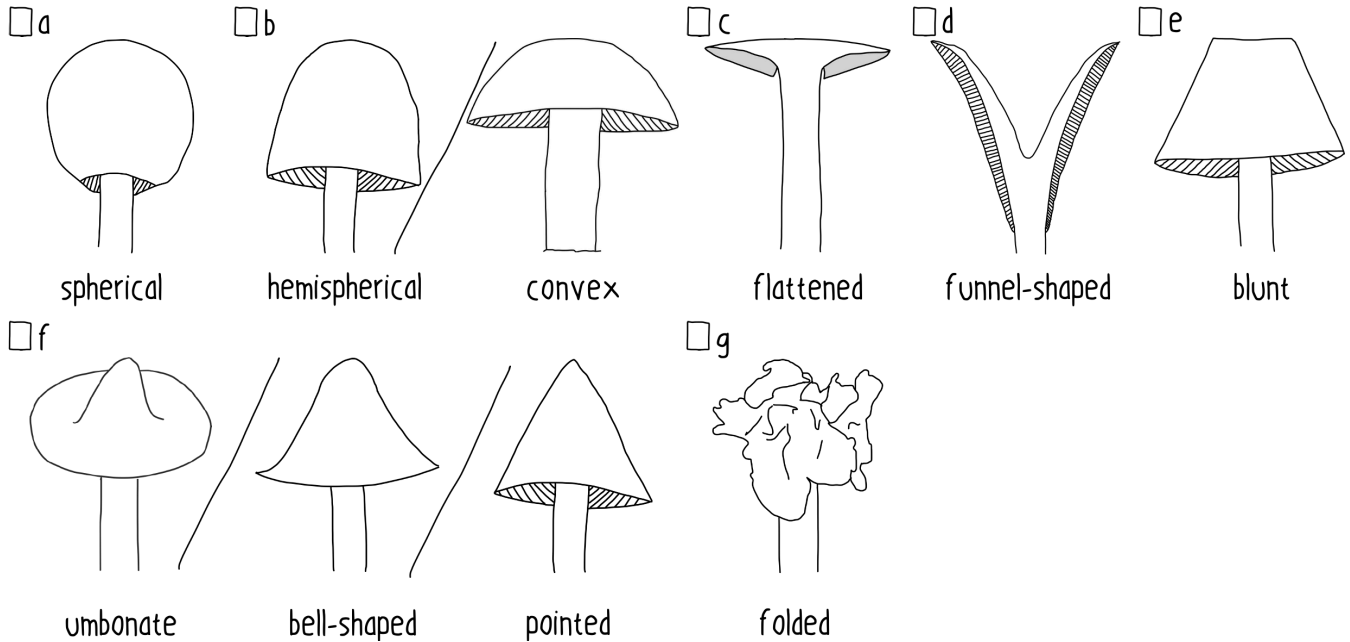
1. Structure of the mushroom

For all questions, one or more crosses can always be possible.

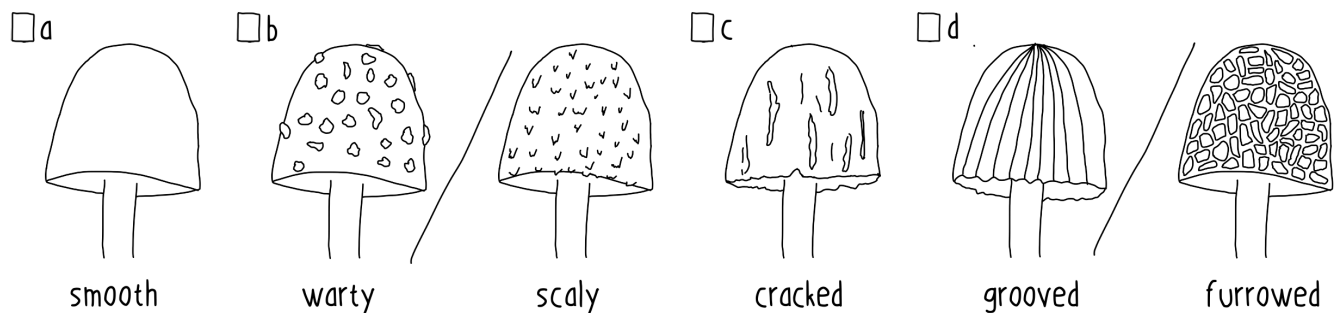
- Clearly contrasting stem
- Gillies/ridges (lines) or pores (holes) present under the cap
- Other structure → jump to page 6 point 5

2. Cap

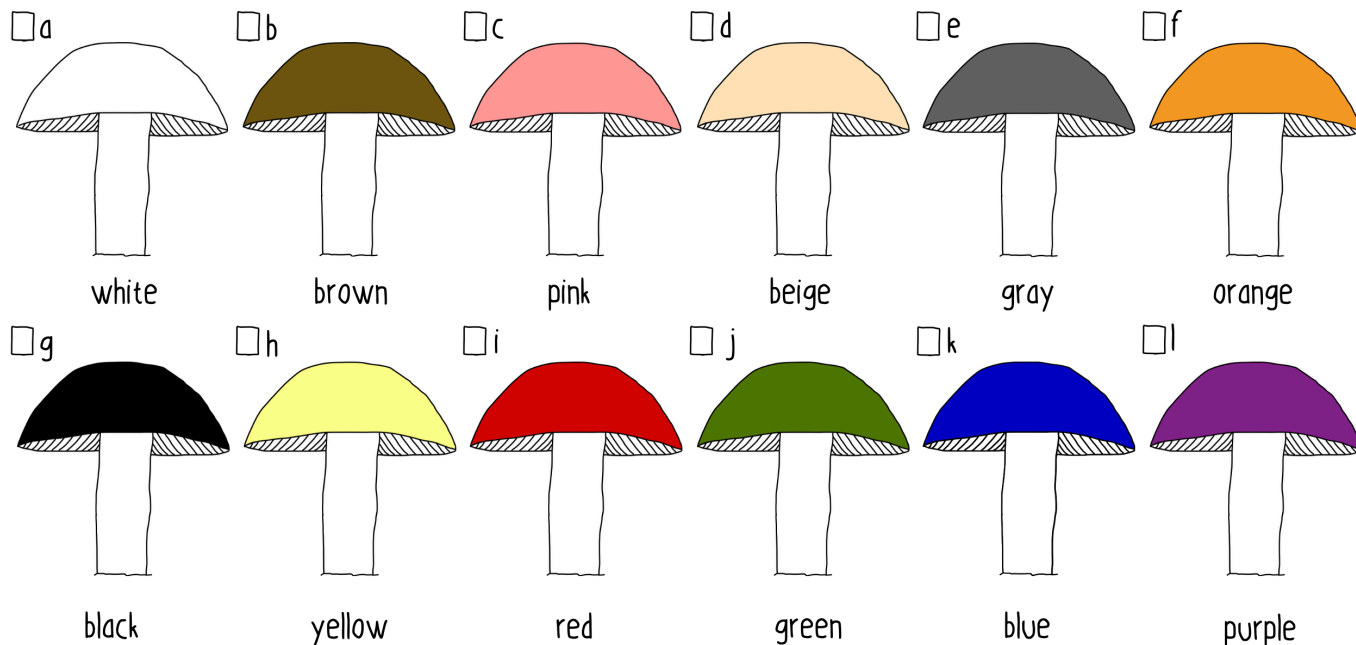
2a Cap shape



2b Cap surface



2c Cap color

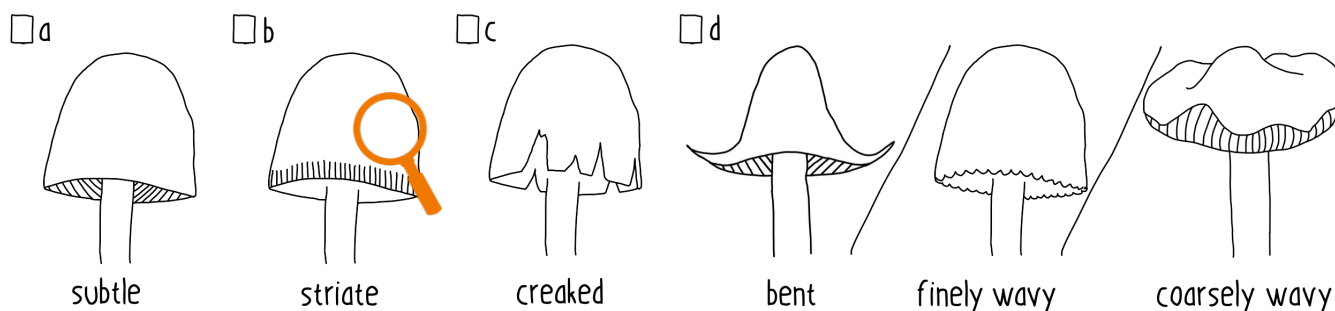


2d Comparison of cap top and bottom

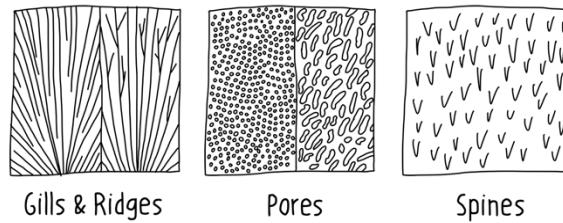
- Different top and bottom
- No different top and bottom → jump to page 4 point 4

2f Cap margin

Inwardly rolled margin is not a feature – normal for young mushrooms.

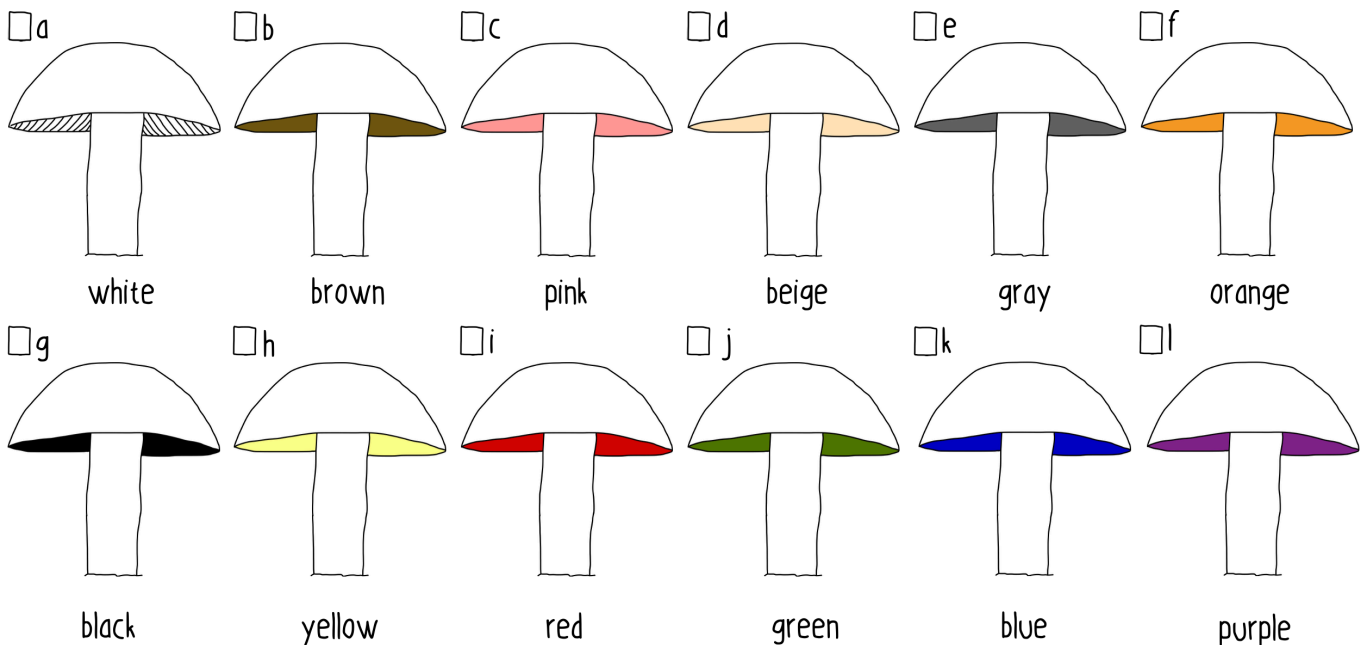


3. Spore layer



- Spore layer present under the cap
- None of these spore layers present → jump to page 4 point 4

3a Spore layer paint



3b spore layer form

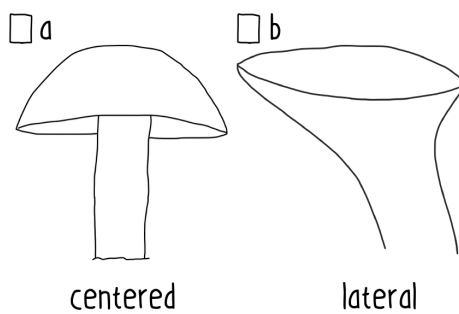
- Spore layer under the cap consists of lamellae or strips
- Spore layer under the cap consists of pores
- Neither of the two characteristics applies



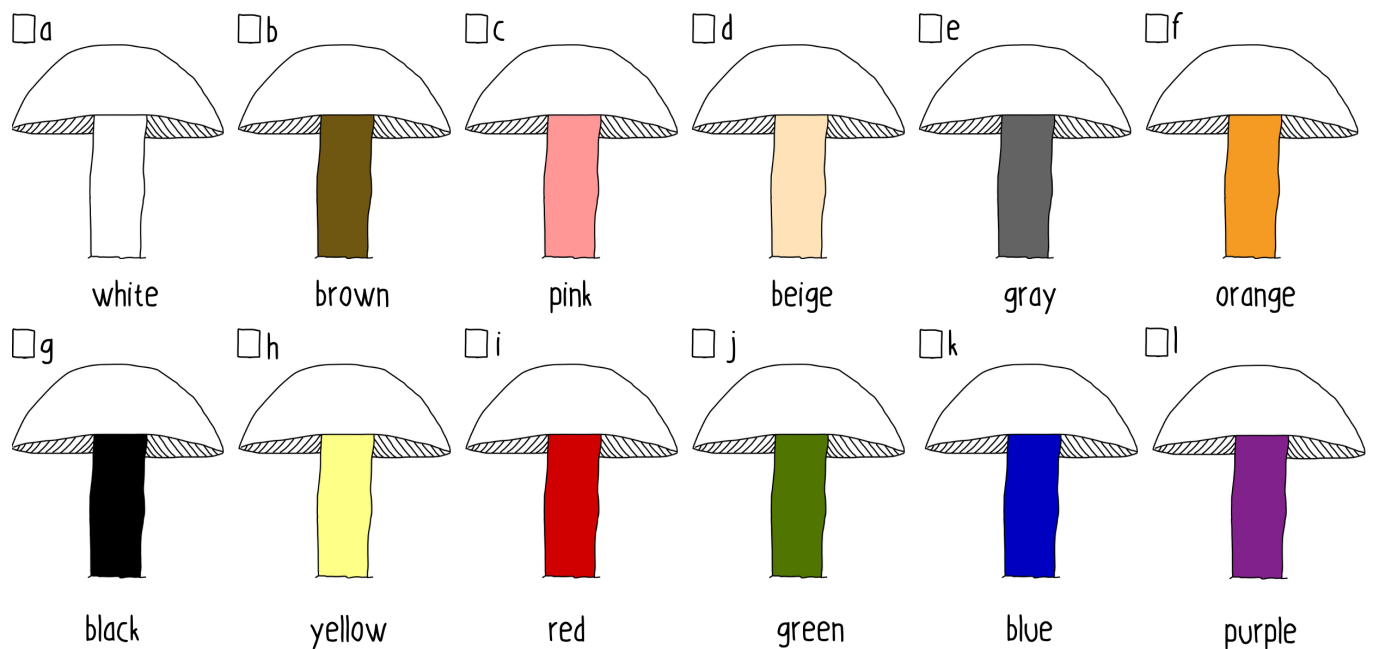
4. Stem

- Stem available
- Severely shortened or missing stem → jump to page 7 point 6

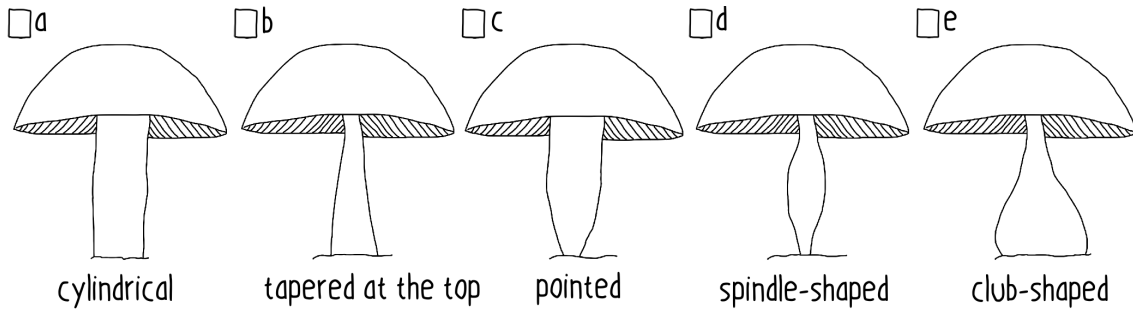
4a Stem position (Where is the stem attached to the cap?)



4b Stem color

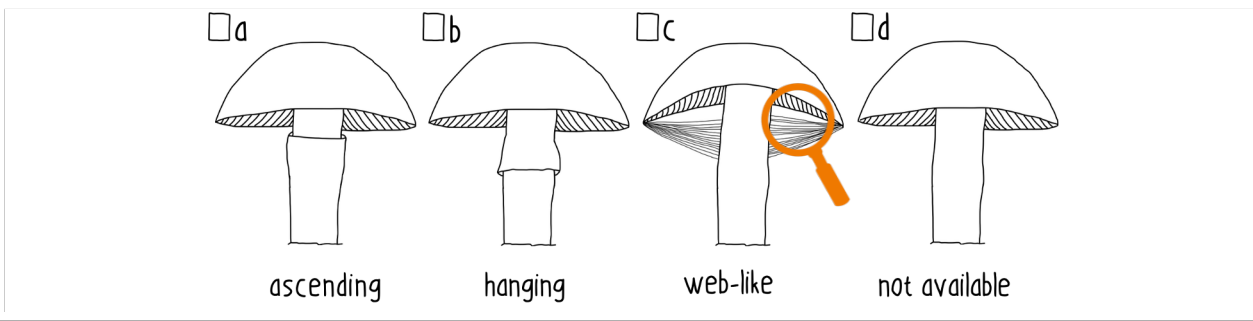


4c Stem Shape

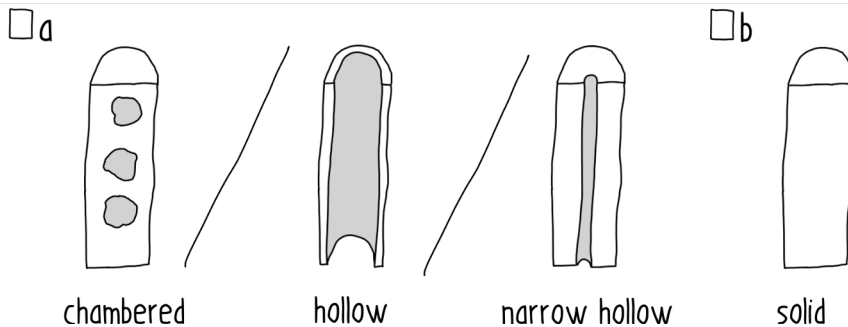


4d ring and fiber residues on the stem

The cobweb layer detaches easily and is difficult to see; also check the edge of the












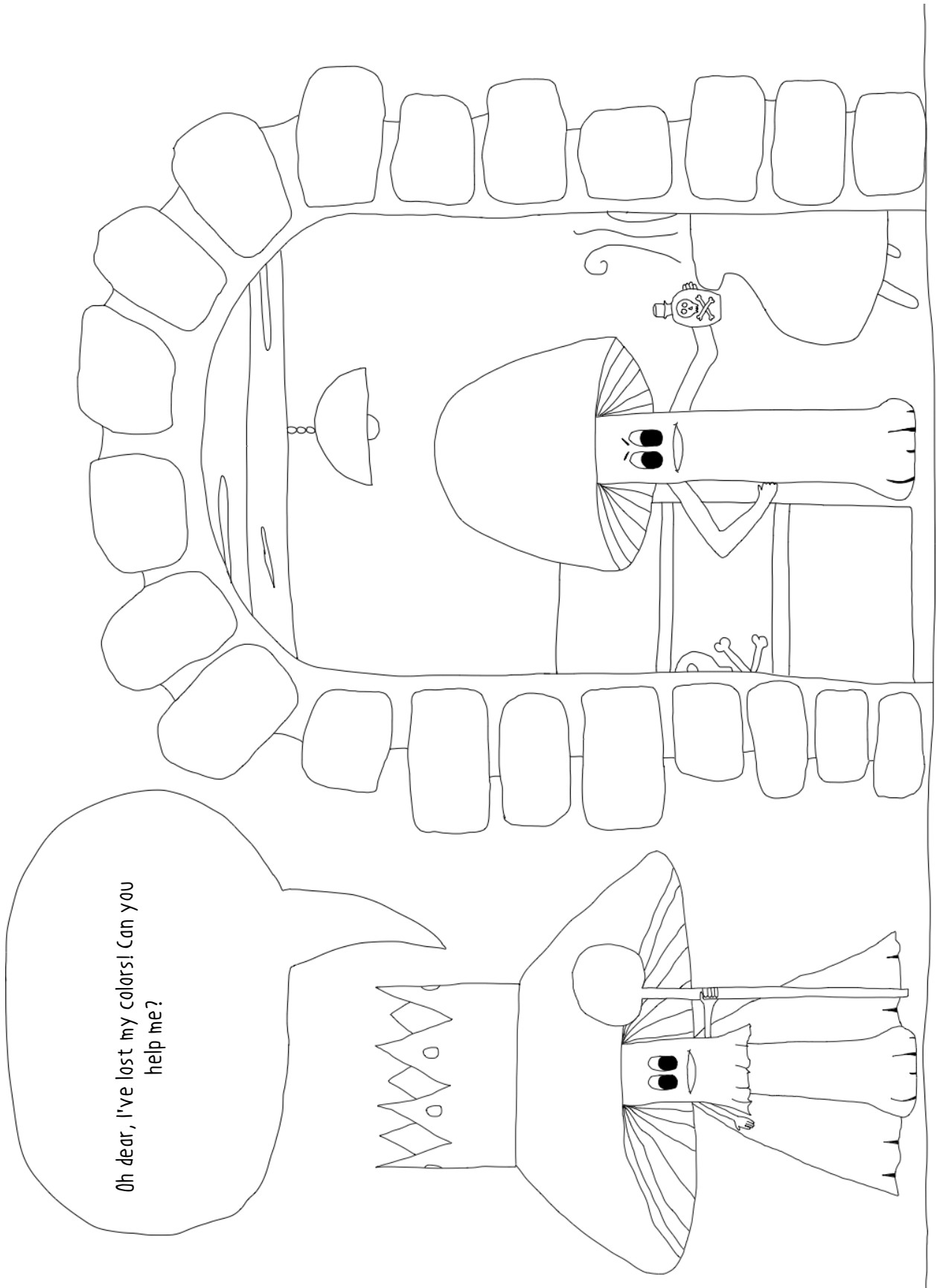


6. Flesh (What color is the inside of the mushroom?)
